"Great," thought Jay C. I., "that's helpful." With a smile on his face, the little king carried on...






The purple queen said to him:

The little king travelled further...




The blue king knew:



Suddenly the little king Jay C. I. looked up and couldn't believe his eyes. In the distance he saw a castle. Was he already back home?


He had travelled happily and effortlessly around the world and had received great pieces of advice.




And because the meetings were so wonderful, they started to organise conferences at least twice a year.
